“Children Are Not Small Adults”

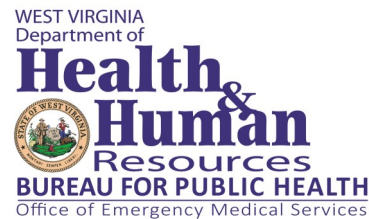

Faculty

James A. Kaplan, MD is the Deputy Chief Medical Examiner for the State of West Virginia. Dr. Kaplan served as the West Virginia Chief Medical Examiner from 1997 until 2013. He completed a Fellowship in forensic pathology in San Antonio, Texas. Dr. Kaplan has authored numerous journal articles and is a nationally known speaker. In 2012, Dr. Kaplan received the West Virginia Children's Justice Task Force "Extra Mile Award" for his leadership in the development of a Statewide pediatric child abuse evaluation service, and for pediatric forensic injury assessment services for Child Protective Services (CPS).

Bethany L. Hayes is an accomplished and dedicated law enforcement professional with more than 16 years of experience in the field. Ms. Hayes is a Felony Investigator with the Muskingum County Prosecutor's Office in Zanesville, Ohio. Ms. Hayes has a BA in Criminal Justice from Muskingum University and certification in the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy from Zanesville, Ohio. She was awarded the Brian T. Wag-

ner Community Leadership Award by the Muskingum County Community Foundation in 2015. Ms. Hayes was awarded the Medal of Valor for saving two people's lives from an injury crash in a lake in 2008.

David A. Kappel, MD, FACS is Clinical Professor of Surgery at West Virginia University and has practiced Plastic Surgery for more than 35 years. Currently, Dr. Kappel is the Deputy State Medical Director for the West Virginia Trauma System and is a Clinical Ethics Consultant and chair of the Organizational Ethics subcommittee at Wheeling Hospital in Wheeling, West Virginia. He has served as President of the Western Trauma Association (WTA) and has multiple publications and presentations in the field of reconstructive plastic surgery, communication in trauma and EMS systems and Bioethics for pre-hospital providers.

Thomas Marshall, MD, FACEP is Assistant Professor of Emergency Medicine, West Virginia University Hospitals, and is Emergency Department Medical Director at United Hospital Center in Bridgeport, West Virginia. Dr. Marshall is currently President of the West Virginia Chapter of the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) and West Virginia delegate to the ACEP national council. Dr. Marshall completed an Emergency Medicine Residency at West Virginia University. He serves on multiple statewide committees and is a member of the Always Ready for Kids (ARK) Medical Advisory Committee.

Michael Mills, DO, FACEP is Medical Director for the West Virginia Office of Emergency Medical Services (OEMS) and has more than 35 years of Emergency Medicine experience. Dr. Mills is a fellow of the American College of Emergency Physicians. He also has more than 35 years of prehospital medical direction experience and has served as squad medical director for numerous Florida EMS agencies and Logan Emergency Ambulance Services Authority (LEASA) in Logan, West Virginia.

Melvin Wright, DO, FAAP is Associate Professor of Pediatrics at West Virginia University School of Medicine and Clinical Assistant Professor of Pediatrics, Adjunct Faculty at the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine. Dr. Wright is currently the Medical Director of West Virginia University Children's Hospital Pediatric Intensive Care Unit and the Medical Director of West Virginia University Children's Hospital Pediatric Ground Transport Program. Dr. Wright completed a Pediatric Critical Care Fellowship at Primary Children's Medical Center in Salt Lake City, Utah. He has served on

numerous international and state committees and is currently a member of the West Virginia OEMS Medical Policy Care Committee (MPCC) and the West Virginia Always Ready for Kids (ARK) Medical Advisory Committee.

Instructions for WV EMS Pre-Hospital Providers
